The Analysis of Infinitely Small Things – A Fun, Informal Expedition into the Everyday Environment

What things are so Infinitely Small that we do not notice them around us? Cracks, dust, and microbes? A candy wrapper, a curb, a shadow on a building? The sun and stars? How might we begin to discover and document the Infinitely Small Things that surround us?

Using magnifying glasses, microscopes, and other field research tools, participants in the expedition will scour the everyday environment for Infinitely Small Things. Kanarinka, a Boston-based new media artist, will provide a special guidebook (based on a calculus text written in 1696 by the Marquis de l'Hôpital) with written instructions to guide participants' investigations and will be on-site to facilitate the expedition.

Participants will carefully document and sample each Infinitely Small Thing. The results of the expedition's research will be published in an online catalog at www.infinitelysmallthings.net and included as part of the "sans terre" exhibit by spurse at MASSMOCA's "The Interventionists: Art in the Social Sphere" (opening May 30).

This participatory artwork is informal and **FUN**. Kids and adults of all ages are encouraged to attend, discover the Infinitely Small Things that surround us everyday, and contribute their research results to a quickly growing online catalog of Infinitely Small Things from around the world (www.infinitelysmallthings.net).
